Children in America Today

- International rank of US in the rate of child poverty: 2nd highest out of the 35 richest countries.
- Portion of 5 year olds in the US NOT ready for Kindergarten: 40%
 - Children from high-income families are exposed to 30 million more words than children from families in poverty. Studies showed that these differences in language and interaction experiences have lasting effects on a child's performance later in life.
 - Average middle class child enters 1st grade with 1000 to 1700 hours of one on one picture book reading. It is 25 hours for low income children.
 - A child who hears too few words is typically not ready for Kindergarten. By 3rd grade, their reading levels are below average. The greatest indicator for dropping out of high school is a low reading level in the 3rd grade
- The rank of the US in high school graduation rates: 23rd (79%)
- Rank of the United States for quality and availability of childcare: 22nd (quality) and 31st (availability).
 - In California by state regulations, cemeteries must be inspected more often than child care centers.
 - Only 10% of child care centers in the US are accredited.
- 25% of American children ages birth to 5 live in poverty.
- The rank of the US in Gross Domestic Product: 1st
We are the wealthiest country in the world, but we are failing our children.
